I have completed the repotting of all my deciduous trees, a task that was not helped by the cold wet weather, and most of my conifers have also been repotted. Now the task of pinching and pruning the new growth on the deciduous trees is taking place, particularly with the Japanese maples. Now that the weather is warming up I will begin to repot my native trees. Our next workshop that was to be held at Jill's house on 2nd October might need be cancelled, depending on lockdowns and we will keep you informed as to whether the meeting on 20th October will go ahead. Bonsai repotting guide

Make sure you have the right tools, a root rake (or plain old butter knife), scissors, wire cutter, and a chopstick or something similar.



Often Bonsai are anchored by wire to the pot they are planted in, in that case, cut the wire away.

Carefully remove the tree from its pot using a root rake or round bladed knife. This will slide round the edges of the pot to take the dirt away from the sides of the pot, making it easier to come out.

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Evaluate if repotting is necessary, in this case, it is, as the roots are circling around the inside of the pot.

5. Using a chopstick, carefully remove the old soil, start on the sides and bottom of the tree. Try to avoid damaging roots in the process. When repotting pines, leave at least half the root mass untouched to protect the mycorrhizal fungus which is essential for the tree's survival.



6. Using scissors, cut away any roots that have grown too long. Do not prune more than 30% of all roots. The root pruning is important for balancing the growth of your Bonsai.



In this case, we repot the tree into the same pot. We prepare the pot by covering the drainage holes with mesh. You can wire the tree into the pot if you wish. Wiring a tree in, especially if a larger tree, will help to keep the plant stable until the root system has grown back.

Fertilizing – What is it? What does it do?

(N) Nitrogen: Helps plants grow quickly, whilst also increasing the production of seed and fruit, and bettering the quality of leaf and foliage growth. Nitrogen is also a component of chlorophyll, the substance that give plants their green color, and also aids in photosynthesis.

(P) Phosphorus also plays a part in the photosynthesis process, it also supports the oils, sugars and starches. The transformation of solar energy into chemical energy is aided by Phosphorous as well as the development of the plant and its ability to withstand stress. Phosphorus also encourages the growth of the roots and promotes blooming.

(K) Potassium assists also in the photosynthesis, fruit quality, the building of protein, and the reduction of disease.

Whilst these three elements only scratch the surface of healthy plant nutrition and growth, they are the main nutrients required in the development of healthy, productive plants.
